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## 15:45 Scholarship and student agency: engaging students in research as part of the higher education proposition

Debbie McVitty, Head of Policy, National Union of Students

As a concept carrying significant policy currency and spanning multiple aspects of higher education, student engagement can sometimes appear to mean everything and nothing. Focusing on research and scholarship recalibrates the notion of engagement back to the core of higher education – student engagement with knowledge. Debbie will argue that developing the disciplines and practices of scholarship while studying are a key element in achieving higher education outcomes for students and ensuring students have a meaningful stake in their learning environment.

## 16:05 Start-up of the associate degree in The Netherlands: An example

The Associate degree (EQF level 5, UK's Foundation degree) is the latest addition to the Dutch education system. The pilot started in 2011 and was formalised in 2013. Rotterdam Academy, part of Rotterdam University of Applied Sciences, made fundamental choices to organise a new education level and Eric Aldewereld will illustrate this journey. Including collaboration with two institutions for vocational training, separate positioning, focus on counselling and well connected to employers in the region. It now offers 10 programmes with approximately 1600 students.
